Dear Ms. Creary and Mr. Tettey,

As a recent veteran of one of the longest faculty strikes in Canadian university history, I am confident that my fellow professors and librarians at Université Sainte-Anne are equally saddened by the seeming breakdown in collective bargaining between Carleton University Academic Staff Association [CUASA] and your representatives.

In hopes of better learning conditions for your students and research conditions for your researchers, may I cordially remind you:

- 1. at any university, the working conditions of faculty and librarians are <u>inseparable</u> from the learning conditions of students.
- 2. the <u>invention of insulin</u> is an example of Canadian university research, as is Michael Ondaatje's Booker-prize winning novel *The English Patient* and, with help from the Social Sciences and Research Council of Canada, Dr. Suzette Mayr's Giller-Prize winning novel *The Sleeping Car Porter* (U. Calgary).
- 3. that Ontario <u>Auditor General Bonnie Lysyk's 2022 Special Report</u> on Laurentian University finds that:
 - a. academic salaries were not responsible for Laurentian's financial difficulties,
 - b. while bloated administrative salaries and perks arguably were.
- 4. that at Canadian university after Canadian university, <u>well-paid administrators</u> continue to improve their own compensation while <u>public financial support for universities declines</u>.

In a bitter irony, teaching and research at Canadian universities annually reconfirms that university education is a superb public investment. Sadly, this knowledge is ignored by Canada's self-enriching university administrators. I urge your negotiating team to return to bargaining in good faith with CUASA to let your faculty deliver the unquestionable value of excellent education.
